### Examples from the analysis

#### Example 1: *Question design - Initiative*

Colleague journalist Jeroen Wollaars from NOS is interviewed about his reading of the 8000 pages with diplomatic messages that he received this afternoon from WikiLeaks.

(1) *Introduction to the question (PR=Rik van de Westelaken, IE=colleague Jeroen Wollaars in NOS office)*

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PR → *Yes, Jeroen, you have been busy all day digging in these documents. Erm, what else is remarkable?*

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#### Example 2 *Question design – Assertiveness*

Bram Moszkowicz, the lawyer of right-wing party leader Geert Wilders – who had been charged with offending Muslims, fear mongering and discrimination – is interviewed about an error of the criminal investigation department. Employees of this department travelled abroad to interview a witness in the court case, but left the tape on the plane.

(2) *Prefacing the question with statements or arguments in favour of one of the answering alternatives (IR=PowNews reporter Rutger Castricum, IE= lawyer Bram Moszkowicz)*

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IR → *Mister Moszkowicz, we erm have seen a number of slips in erm the Wilders court case. Erm yes, now it is the criminal investigation department that has gone off track again. Is this erm is that serious?*

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Example 3 *Question design - Assertiveness*

NOS-reporter in The Hague Dominique van der Heyde is interviewed about the receipt of the publication of the WikiLeaks documents in political circles of The Hague.

- (3) *Suggestive sentence mode (PR=Rik van de Westelaken, IE=NOS-reporter in The Hague Dominique van der Heyde)*

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PR → *Yes, Dominique, erm, as yet no big revelations, are there?*

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Example 4 *Question design - Assertiveness*

PowNews interviewer Jojanneke van den Berge addresses left-wing party leader Job Cohen.

- (4) *'Tilted' question with a preference for an answer that is damaging to the interviewee (IR=Jojanneke van den Berge, IE=left-wing party leader Job Cohen)*

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IR → *Isn't the left wing just a bit out of date?*

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Example 5 *Question design - Opposition*

PowNews interviewer Daan Nieber inspects the kitchen of a Chinese restaurant in Moerdijk and interviews an employee on the spot, because the restaurant might be responsible for delivering poisoned food to aid workers of the fire.

- (5) *Oppositional introduction is the focus of the question (IR=Daan Nieber, IE=employee or owner of a Chinese restaurant in Moerdijk)*

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IR → *Let's have a look. Yes, no, the rubber strips. Yes, the rubber strips have to be cleaned. Here are some sauces in a dish and some eh some meat. Yes, it does not seem to be very clean. Can you- Can you just explain what it is like with respect to hygiene?*

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Example 6 *Question design - Opposition*

PowNews interviewer Jojanneke van den Berge addresses left-wing Member of Parliament Ronald Plasterk at a party that aims to tighten the bonds in Dutch left-wing politics. The theme of the party - 'The Seventies' - is apparent from the clothes that many people - apart from the interviewee - are wearing.

- (6) *Oppositional or critical posture runs through the question in its entirety (IR=Jojanneke van den Berge, IE=left-wing Member of Parliament Ronald Plasterk)*

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IR → *You are wearing the wrong outfit today.*

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Example 7: *Evaluation*

The president of Tunisia Ben Ali fled from his country because of the popular fury over several weeks.

(7) A news interview with characteristics of 'evaluation' (PR=Rik van de Westelaken, IE = NOS correspondent in Tunis Nicole le Fever)

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- PR: Erm Nicole, do you know where the president has fled to?
- IE: Yes, first the story was 'he has been spotted at the airport', next it was said 'he has been arrested', and the la- according to the latest information he is on Malta and has received help from his friend, the leader of Libya Gaddafi in getting there.
- PR: And who is this premier who is functioning as interim president now, Al Ghannouchi?
- IE: Well, Mohammed Ghannouchi, he enjoys higher esteem than erm the president anyhow. He is not a beloved people's politician or anything like that, but he is respected. It is also in oppositional circles that he is respected and particularly because he is clean, he is not corrupt. Moreover erm international circles like the look of him. Yes and that is different, erm such a clean reputation, than erm the president who has left now.
- PR: Yes, and the people, are they getting a- erm what they want? Something like a real democracy, in your view?
- IE: Well, it is of course difficult to predict how things will go from now on, but it is of course incredible that erm what starts as an action by one boy who burns himself out of frustration, is taken over by the people and that people overcome their fear, erm the fear that has protected the regime until now. Many people are worried about the wording of erm who is the president now, Ghannouchi, because he said 'temporarily' the president is not able to rule, so there is fear that he will come back after all. Well, I do not see that as likely. The country is moving towards erm elections and, erm, yes, it is wait and see until tomorrow how the street will react to this.
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A selection of the instances of evaluation is underlined.

<sup>1</sup> An intensifier is defined as a formulation that can be substituted by a weaker variant (Bolinger, 1972). A distinction is made between lexical intensifiers such as *very*, stylistic intensifiers such as metaphors and semantic intensifiers (Renkema, 1997). Semantic intensifiers are words that can be replaced by a word with a less specific meaning without a significant change of meaning.

<sup>2</sup> Dysphemisms are a subcategory of semantic intensifiers. Dysphemisms are formulations that are more unpleasant or coarse than is strictly necessary (Renkema, 2002). They can be replaced by a more neutral formulation (called the default) without a significant change of meaning.

Example 8: *Evaluation in the trailer, immediately after the headline – PowNews*

Contextual information to the trailer: Bram Moszkowicz, the lawyer of the right-wing party leader Geert Wilders – who had been charged with offending Muslims, fear mongering and discrimination – is being interviewed about an error of the criminal investigation department. Employees of this department travelled abroad to interview Arabist Hans Jansen, who is a witness in the court case, but left the tape on the plane.

- (8) *Evaluation in the trailer, immediately after the headline and before the news kernel, voiced by an expert IE (PR= Dominique Weesie; IE= lawyer Bram Moszkowicz)*

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Headline, spoken by PR:	<i>Arabist-in-hiding Hans Jansen in the news again.</i>
IE:	<i>It is clumsy, isn't it, in such a case – travelling in order to interview mister Jansen – : to leave such a thing on the plane.</i>

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Example 9: *Evaluation in relation to structure and voice – NOS-journaal*

NOS-reporter in The Hague Dominique van der Heyde is interviewed about the receipt of the publication of the WikiLeaks documents in political circles of The Hague.

- (9) *Evaluation, embedded at the end of a news item and voiced by IE (PR=Rik van de Westelaken, IE=NOS-reporter in The Hague Dominique van der Heyde)*

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PR:	<i>Dominique, well, not everything is known yet now, is it? People are still reading. Are the politicians still afraid that exciting revelations will follow?</i>
IE:	<i>Well, erm, if they are afraid of that, erm they are not saying that for sure. They'll just wait. But there definitely are politicians who might profit from this information being public now. Erm and we just said: "Bos was taking quite a kicking (i.e. the left-wing party leader)", erm, but Wouter Bos – it is apparent from these documents – always and right from the start had the same position with respect to lengthening the Afghanistan mission, namely that that could not happen as far as the PvdA (i.e. the Dutch labour party) was concerned. Maybe some people from his party had slightly different opinions, but he has said right from the beginning: "No, we are not going to do that". Well, that erm is erm good erm for sure for a politician who has been</i>
→	<i>accused of changing views in the past, of wavering; it is good that it is public now. It is</i>
→	<i>pleasant for the PvdA, because it is relevant again now with the new discussion about a new</i>
→	<i>mission to Afghanistan, which the PvdA again rejects.</i>

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Example 10: *Evaluation in relation to structure and voice – PowNews*

NOS-reporter Rutger Castricum interviews Bram Moszkowicz, the lawyer of right-wing party leader Geert Wilders – who had been charged with offending Muslims, fear mongering and discrimination – about an error of the criminal investigation department. Employees of this department travelled abroad to interview a witness in the court case, but left the tape on the plane.

- (10) *Evaluation at the beginning, in the middle and at the end of an interview and voiced by IR and IE (IR=PowNews reporter Rutger Castricum, IE=lawyer Bram Moszkowicz)*

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IR:	→ <i>Mister Moszkowicz, we erm have seen a number of slips in erm the Wilders court case. Erm yes, now it is the criminal investigation department that has gone off track again. Is this erm is that serious?</i>
IE:	<i>Erm, actually I cannot review the whole issue, because I do not know whether it fell into the hands of third parties, which would be particularly annoying to mister Jansen if [that-</i>
IR:	<i>[Y-, you you mean the recording?</i>

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IE: Yes.  
 IR: Yes.  
 IE: → Exactly, the recording. And yes, it is clumsy, isn't it, in such a case - travelling in order to interview mister Jansen -: to leave such a thing on the plane.  
 IR: → Because actually, if you look at it, erm, they are people who have to fetch just one simple message in the context of their job, yes, and they come back and forget the message.  
 IE: → Yes, well, I do not know whether the message is as simple as that, because Jansen is being - at least that is what I have understood - interviewed as a witness in the criminal complaint that Wilders and I submitted against mister Schalken. So, interviewing Jansen about that is of course what you expect, but you should take it when you are in the air plane.  
 IR: Erm, have you already discussed this with Geert Wilders by the way?  
 IE: Very briefly, just a moment, yes.  
 IR: What is his opinion about it?  
 IE: → Erm, he is 'not amused', let's put it like that.

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Example 11: *Political position in relation to structure and voice – NOS-journaal*

The screen version of *Sonny Boy*, the famous book by Annejet van der Zijl, receives its premiere. The topic of this non-fictional book is the discrimination that the young, black Surinamese protagonist Waldemar – played by Sergio Hasselbaink - encountered in the Netherlands during the first part of the previous century.

(11) *Political position, voiced by IE at the end of a news item (IR=identity unknown, IE=Sergio Hasselbaink)*

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IR: Can we still learn something from it, from the story?  
 IE: Yes, of course, definitely.  
 IR: And what would that be?  
 IE: → Erm that people have to be more tolerant with other people. Erm that you do not inflict upon others what you don't want to happen to yourself. As it is in the Bible, from which I quote.  
 ((End of the news item, which is the last item before the weather forecast))

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Example 12: *Political position in relation to structure and voice – PowNews*

Reporter Jojanneke van den Berge is interviewing a whole range of participants at a left-wing party that aims to improve political connections. The theme of the party - 'The Seventies' – is apparent from the clothes that many people - the interviewee included – are wearing.

(12) *Political position, initiated by IR, popping up in the middle of a news item and continued by IE (IR=Jojanneke van den Berge, IE=unknown person with remarkable shoes)*

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IR: What terrific erm shoes you have.  
 IE: I just hit my left little toe yesterday, so it [hurts].  
 IR: → [That is of course very exemplary, because the left is also hurting a little bit now, doesn't it?  
 IE: → The left is hurting terribly.
